Bala Cynwyd in 1915: A Visual History Tour

While much has changed since 1915, here is one place that has changed a lot. What was this glorious mansion? What took its place?



In recognition of the library's centennial, Gerald Francis and Leon Levine will present, a virtual history tour of our Bala Cynwyd in 1915. The community developed around the transportation hubs of the Bala Train Station and the Cynwyd Train Station. The inter-active lecture will show more than 70 images, revealing what this community looked like at this time in its development. Some of the landscape has changed, but some areas have remained

the same. Take a tour back in time.

Hear about how the rails became streets and trails; the real meaning of 'Main Line'; how we got all those Welsh station names; and whether there was a "right" side of the tracks.
